Who is Verified Voting?

Our Mission: To strengthen democracy for all voters by promoting the responsible use of technology in elections. We work with elections officials, policymakers, and democracy defenders across party lines to help voters vote and to promote policies that support justified public confidence in elections.

Ballot Handling Procedures

- Strict protocols ensure that ballots are handled securely from the moment they're cast until they're counted. This includes secure storage and transportation, preventing tampering and loss.
- Chain of Custody refers to the processes, or paper trail, that documents the transfer of materials from one person (or place) to the next. Every state and local jurisdiction has its own controls for ensuring the chain of custody of election materials is properly maintained. These controls may include locks, seals, audit logs, witness signatures, or other security measures.





Voting System Testing

- Before and after elections, machines undergo rigorous testing to ensure they're functioning correctly and haven't been tampered with.


Transparency and Observation

- Election processes are open to observation by parties, candidates, and the public, allowing for transparency and independent verification.
- Generally, the purpose for these observers is to provide a layer of protection or transparency and to learn from and improve processes, which vary considerably by state.



Paper Ballots and Records

 More states have moved to paper ballots or systems with verifiable paper trails, allowing voters to confirm their selections and enabling postelection audits to compare machine counts against paper records.





Post-Election Audits

- 45 states conduct some form of post-election audit, with a handful using risk-limiting audits (RLAs). RLAs are especially powerful because they statistically confirm that the reported results are correct, based on a sample of paper ballots.

MAKING A SAFE VOTING PLAN

Tip 1: Understand your voting options.

IN-PERSON VOTING

Can be a good option if you are able to vote when their abusers are busy.

EARLY VOTING

Can give you more flexibility to vote at a time that is convenient and safe for you.

VOTING BY MAIL

Can give you more time to vote discreetly, without your abuser knowing or trying to influence your vote.

MAKING A SAFE VOTING

PLAN

Tip 2: Plan your voting

day.

Plan to vote at a time when your abuser is busy.

Plan your safe transportation ahead of time.

Share your voting plan with a trusted friend, family member, or advocate.

Confirm your voter registration is up to date and you have any documentation you may need to vote.




