
Engaging Voters and Candidates

U.S. Citizens Who Reported Voting in National Elections by Housing Tenure (2008-2018)



California

- Alameda County, Sonoma County authorization of an add. sales tax for social services (Measures W & O)
- San Francisco
 - Realty Transfer Tax will be increased funds will be dedicated to rental assistance (Prop. I)
 - City is now authorized to acquire up to 10,000 units of low-income rental housing (Prop K)



Colorado

- Statewide Repealed Gallagher Amendment- (Amendment B)
- Statewide Increased cigarette/tobacco tax go to Housing Development Grant Fund, Eviction Legal Defense Fund (Prop. EE)
- Boulder Annual excise tax will be paid by LLs, free legal representation for tenants facing eviction (2B)
- Denver Sales tax will be increased to fund homelessness services & affordable housing (2B)

Maryland

 Baltimore - Can now issue \$12 million in bonds to provide funding for Affordable Housing Program (Question A)



Michigan

 Ann Arbor and Kalamazoo County – New property taxes passed – raises funds for affordable homes

North Carolina

 Raleigh and Charlotte- Bond measures passed for housing trust funds

Texas


 Austin- Transportation initiative passed, includes \$300 million of anti-displacement measures (Prop. A)

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- 1. \$100 billion in emergency rent assistance
- 2. Comprehensive, national eviction moratorium
- 3. \$11.5 billion in Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) to support the work of homeless service agencies
- 4. \$13 billion for additional HUD and USDA housing programs



Sources of Power

- Population: 18 million
- Most of the low income people in the state
- 165,151
 affordable
 housing units





Sources of Power

State Assembly District 39

- Difference between the candidates in 2016:
 <u>466 votes</u>
- Number of affordable housing units in the district: <u>4,519</u>


CA Cong. District 39

- Difference between the candidates in 2020:
 <u>4,195 votes</u>
- Number of affordable housing units in the district: <u>3,823</u>



Practical Approaches

- 501(c)3 limitations on candidate support
- Forums and candidate questionnaires



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

- Testifiers: 63



2020 112 candidates responded to survey (C4 survey)

80+ endorsements

\$32,000 contributed to candidates through our PAC

56(ish) candidates we endorsed won their election

Washington Housing Alliance

ACTION FUND





- Committed to affordable housing as a human need and to applying a racial equity lens to her work
- Primary election results: 49.1% (opponent 50.8% about 2,000 votes difference!)

Angie Homola (10th LD)

- Recognizes environmental racism and is committed to a shift away from regressive tax structure
- Primary election results: 26.3% (opponent 46.3%)

Dave Paul (10th LD)

- Committed to anti-racist policy and supporting bills for affordable housing
- Primary election results: 47% (opponent 48.7% - about 1,000 votes difference!)

David Hackney (11th LD)

- Champion for tenant protections, including Just Cause evictions and rent stabilization
- Primary election results: 45.5%









Tanisha Harris (17th LD)

- Strong commitment to expanding access to affordable homes and increasing tenant protections
- Primary election results: 46.7% (opponent 53.2%)

Joy Stanford (26th LD)

- Significant experience and commitment to supporting people impacted by unjust housing policies, will use racial justice framework toward ending homelessness
- Primary election results: 42.9%

T'wina Nobles (28th LD)

- Personal experience with renting and housing instability, committed to closing the racial wealth gap
- Primary election results: 50.2% (opponent 49.7%, about 1,000 votes difference!)

Sharon Shewmake (42nd LD)

- Recognizes affordable housing as a basic human need and top budget priority
- Primary election results: 49.5% (opponent 50.4%, about 1,000 votes difference!)
